
Our Local History and Genealogy collection contains books, photographs

ON THE SHELF





EXPLORING OUR HISTORY

Focus on a Commerce Family

Nathaniel Stiggers moved to Commerce from Naples, Texas sometime after his birth in 1917. He married Ruth Nell Pitts, and they began married life with Nathaniel playing ball for the Black Sox Baseball Team in Commerce. He was so good that he played for teams in Oregon, Idaho, and New York State. After retiring from his baseball career, he returned home to Commerce to play and coach for ball teams in Commerce.

Douglas Stiggers, who had been born in 1936, helped his dad build a baseball field in the 1950s in the Norris Community so that they could practice and host other teams. Douglas and his two sisters, Arvessor and Annie, enjoyed basketball and played on winning teams for Norris High School. Douglas married Glenda Herring and much later married Eva Mae Martin. Both women also played basketball on winning teams for Norris High

School. Douglas was influential in the Norris Community, helping the Norris Community Club to improve the roads, parks, playground, and telephone service in the 1970s. Douglas just died this year in February. He will be sorely missed by his family and friends.

Nathaniel's grandchildren have also played sports for Commerce High School. Gary Stiggers played football for the Arkansas Razorbacks and Denver Broncos. He has been a teacher, referee and umpire. Sheena played basketball for Commerce High School and is now a laboratory technician for Saputo Laboratories. Vetti Hickson did not play sports and instead was a Junior Rotarian, member of the student council, FTA, and NHS at Commerce High School. She is in Human Resources for the Baylor Health Care System.

In 2003, Nathaniel Stiggers was honored with his name above the new ball field in Ivory Moore Park. Douglas threw out the first pitch and the crowd listened to the mayor proclaim

Nathaniel Stiggers Day! Just this month, the Commerce City Council voted to make improvements to the park where Douglas threw that pitch! We hope Nathaniel would be pleased.
